Performers' Bios

Anna Armstrong

Anna has been playing the piano for most of her life, beginning with lessons at the age of 8. She accompanied choruses at her high school in Atlanta and was chosen as accompanist for the Georgia All-State Chorus in her senior year. After many years of only occasional playing, she began taking piano lessons again, with Glen Eckman in Tucker, GA, around 2001. In 2012, she discovered Summertrios, a music camp for adult amateurs, and fell in love with chamber music. She is now on the board of Summertrios, serving currently as treasurer. Upon retiring from public accounting in 2016, she was able to concentrate on her music more seriously. She especially loves playing in duos, trios and quartets as the opportunity presents itself. Anna is happy to be a part of two different piano groups where members gather informally and play for each other's enjoyment. In addition, she is now a member of Georgia Musicale Group, which provides even more opportunities for playing and socializing with musicians of all ability levels.

Pam Asberry

Pam Asberry owns Asberry School of Music in Dacula and is a busy adjudicator, speaker, pianist, and composer. She began private piano lessons at the age of seven and received the Bachelor of Music Degree and the Master of Music Degree in Piano Performance and Piano Education Arts from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. She has studied with Mary Jane Grizzell, Don Beattie, Guy Duckworth and Martha Thomas and performs with the Redeemer Piano Ensemble of Atlanta and the Gwinnett Symphony Wind Orchestra. Teaching since 1979, Pam is a member of Music Teachers National Association, Georgia Music Teachers Association, and Gwinnett County Music Teachers Association.

Dr. Joe Chapman (Guest Artist)

Dr. Joe Chapman is an active concert pianist who has performed hundreds of solo recitals for arts associations, colleges, schools, and churches throughout the state of Georgia. Recently, he has presented an eight-concert tour entitled *An Evening with Gershwin*, performed Beethoven's *Emperor Concerto* with the North Georgia Symphony, and played a solo recital of the music of Bach, Beethoven, and Brahms. He holds degrees in piano performance from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and the University of South Carolina. Dr. Chapman is the senior music faculty member at the University of North Georgia, having joined the faculty in 1983. He is the founder and director of the university's ever-popular *All American Piano Celebration*, which is now in its thirtieth year. Dr. Chapman serves as director of the Dawson Community Chorale, where he has conducted performances of numerous major works, including Handel's *Messiah*, Vivaldi's *Gloria* and the Schubert *Mass in G Major* in collaboration with the University of North Georgia Orchestra. In addition to his responsibilities at UNG, he has served the music profession in a number of capacities, including a term as president of the Georgia Music Teachers Association.

Trevin Dye

Trevin Dye is a native of Atlanta, Georgia whose love of music has truly been life-long. Although he has never had a long-standing formal teacher, he excelled and has always been very active in music, beginning at Woodward Academy and continuing with numerous competitions in piano and vocal performance while at Douglass High School in Atlanta. His interest in international affairs and music have brought him to live and perform in Tbilisi (former Soviet Georgia), Moscow and Japan, as well as study at Oberlin College in Ohio. Trevin currently serves as the Assistant Director of International Business Development for the Japanese government in Atlanta, and has just recently returned to his musical hobby after more than a decade hiatus. He is also the newest president of the Pro-Mozart Society of Atlanta. He continues to be very active in numerous artistic, social, professional and philanthropic endeavors domestically and internationally.

Dr. Ed Ewing

Dr. Ed Ewing took piano lessons from ages 9-18, then took up piano again after retiring from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, where he had provided infectious disease pathology diagnostic consultation to physicians worldwide, conducted laboratory research on diseases of public health interest, authored or co-authored many medical publications, taught courses on HIV/AIDS to other physicians at the national level, and served as a laboratory chief. He also developed new information technology for the agency, leading the team that created the popular Public Health Image Library (http://phil.cdc.gov) which continues to provide medical images to the media today. In his retirement, world travel, continuing education, volunteer work, local politics, and multiple hobbies all pleasantly compete with piano practice time!

Abbie Hattauer, a 2010 transplant from Long Island, New York, has a varied music background. An avocational piano player for more than 40 years, she is currently studying classical guitar with Chad Shivers and sings in the choir of the Emerson Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Marietta. Her operatic experience came as a member of the Island Lyric Opera Company based in Garden City, New York where she performed in more than a dozen major operas and operettas for over twenty years. As their mezzo soprano soloist she sang such roles as Suzuki in Puccini's *Madama Butterfly*, Amneris in Verdi's *Aida*, Siebel in Gounod's *Faust*, Annina in Verdi's *La Traviata*, Zozo in Lehar's *Merry Widow*, Lola in Mascagni's *Cavalleria Rusticana*, La Principessa in Puccini's *Sour Angelica* and Prince Orlofsky in Strauss's *Die Fledermaus*.

She is the director and piano instructor at Hawk Music Studios.
